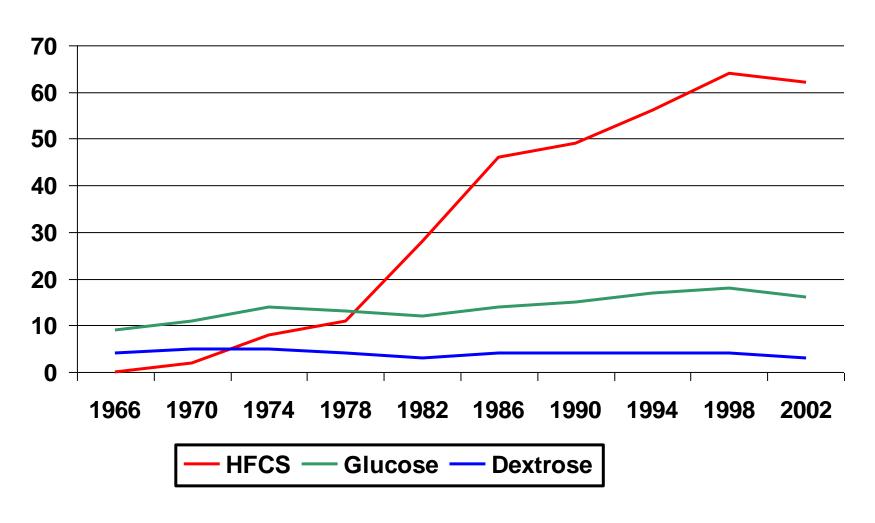

Corn Sweetener consumed in the United States, 1996 - 2002

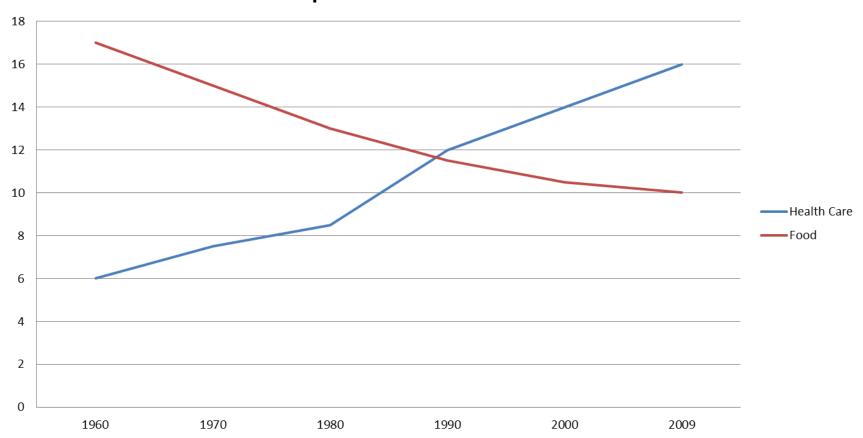


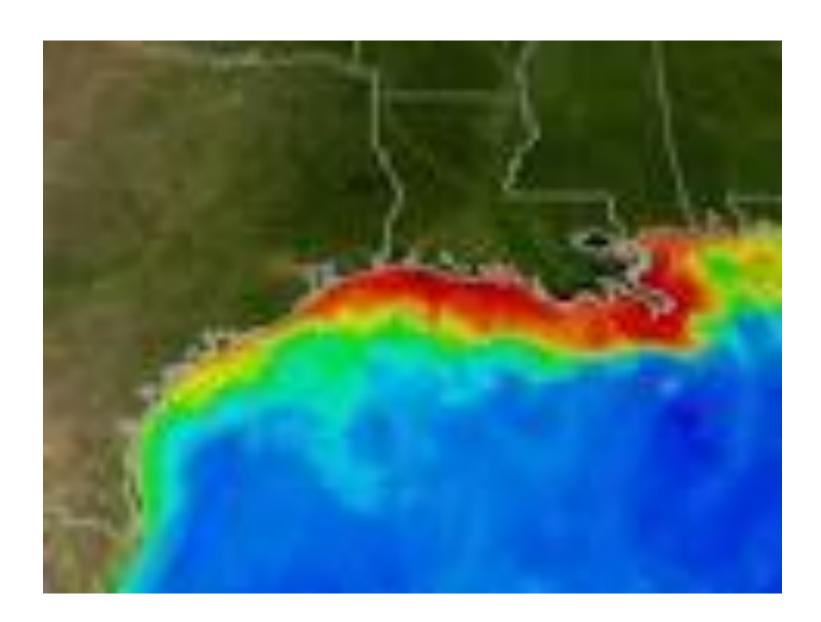
By 1990, over half the US population lived within a 3 minute drive of a McDonalds

1970: gas - \$.36 milk - \$1.40/gal farmer - \$11/cwt

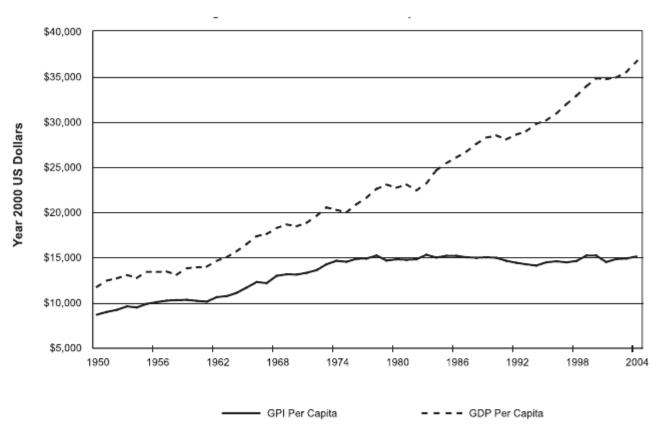
2015: gas - \$2 Milk - \$3.25/gal farmer - \$13.50

Figure 3 shows the trend in GDP and GPI for the US from 1950 to 2004. Despite steady growth in GDP, the US economy, measured by GPI, has actually stagnated since the late 1970s as income inequality, environmental degradation, and the US's failing international position take their toll on real economic progress (Talberth, Cobb et al. 2007).

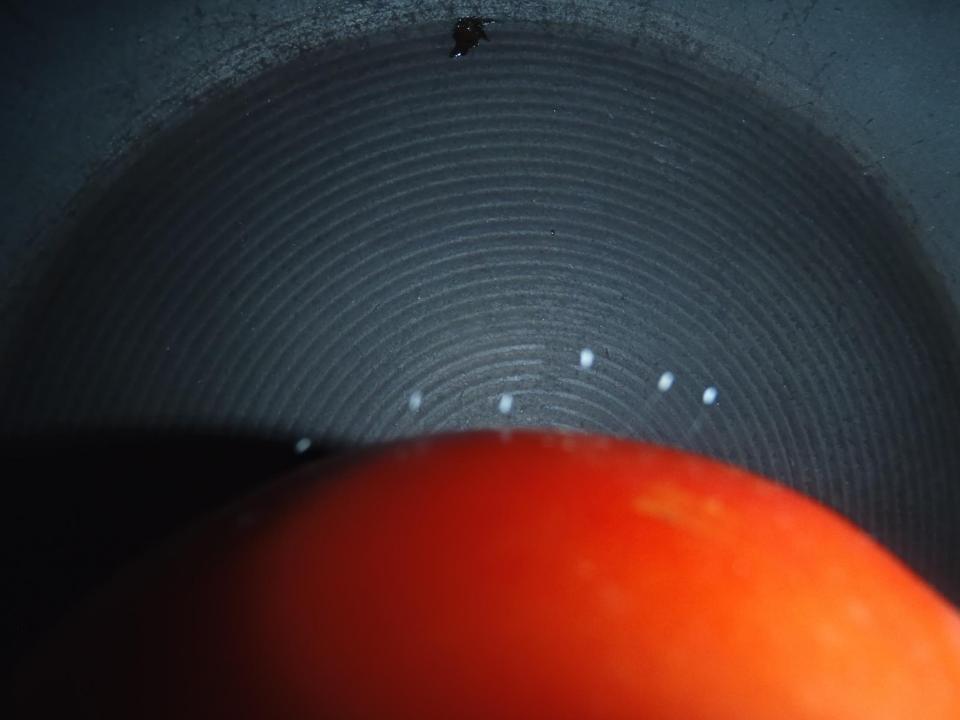

BUT... We still have major problems



Eating well vs eating fast and cheap

 Fast food restaurants spent \$4.2 Billion on marketing in 2009 alone; they vastly outnumber grocery stores

Average calorie intake has increased by 25% since 1970

 Eating well is still much less convenient, seems more expensive

Distribution of Farm Subsidies 1995 - 2010

Top 10 % of farmers - \$30,750 per year

Bottom 80% of farmers - \$587 per year

Nearly 2/3 of all farmers receive no federal subsidies

USDA 2015 study

 From 2002 – 2007, # of farms selling Direct To Consumer increased by 17%, and total DTC sales increase 32%

 However, from 2007 – 2012, the number of farmers selling DTC increased by 5%, but total DTC sales did not increase

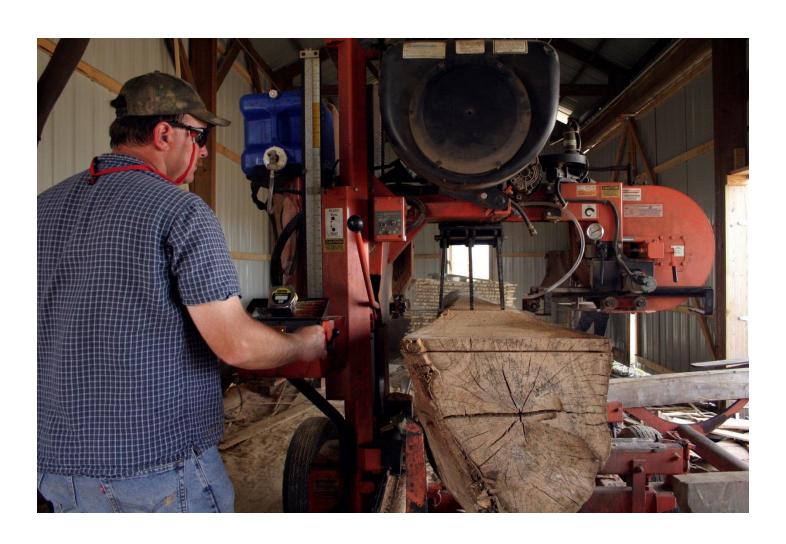

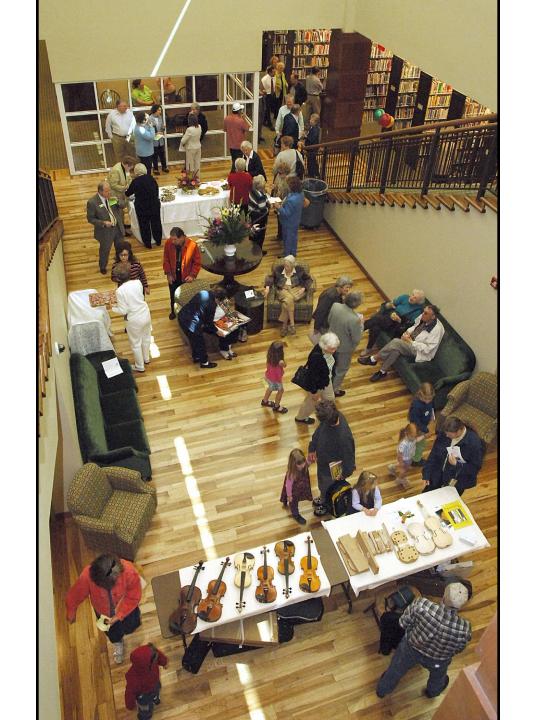
